



World History 9

The class this semester will cover numerous topics covering the time period of 1100 to present with special emphasis on European history during this time frame. The class could include a review of ancient European history (Greeks, Romans, the rise of Christianity, the growth of early nations, the Dark/Middle Ages and the Byzantine Empire) in a quick review unit prior to introduction a major units including the Renaissance, Reformation, Absolutism, the Enlightenment, political and industrial revolutionary thought, Imperialism, Nationalism, famous revolutions, and then both World War I and II. The course is designed to introduce students to historical concepts and prepare them for future classroom and critical thinking challenges as they progress through the high school social studies requirements. Reading comprehension, note taking, and expression and understanding through writing and positive class participation will be expected in the class and consistent class attendance is strongly suggested.

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Global Studies 9
